




Interviewing a YouTuber

Tell us a little bit about your YouTube channel.

Shut Up and POETRY is a slam poetry YouTube channel hosted by two slam poets in Austin, Texas. Andre Bradford (AKA SC Says) and I host a show every week. We share poets' work and then talk about it after, and we invite people to join our conversation about the topic or poem. We accept submissions from anyone who sends us videos of their work. We typically feature Austin artists, but we have received submissions from around the country, and a few from outside the US!



Shut Up and Poetry was Andre's idea. He had the idea to host a YouTube channel that adds an interactive element (us) to sharing spoken word poetry recordings. We were both interested in spoken word,



but had never performed in Austin when we met in 2014. We love spoken word because it is a unique and concise art form which lends itself to current events and issues, as well as raw personal experiences. Through shared experiences and vulnerability, we bond and form positive relationships in our community. Our mission is to share love, healing, peace, magic, stories, and truth into the world through slam poetry.

How have your videos evolved over time?

When we first started the channel, we had this idea of what hosts should sound like, and we had more of a "reporting" style. Now, we have figured out our style, and we shoot our episodes by having a conversation about the work, and sharing that with viewers. Our videos have become more concise, and our fan base has grown since we first started. We recently started collaborating with APS, so now we have access to higher quality videos than the ones we take on our phones!

What is your favorite part about making these YouTube videos?

It is so much FUN. Andre is one of my best friends, and we have had a blast getting together every week, and passionately sharing our art form with the world. We also get to meet a lot of incredible poets, and having the YouTube channel has been a great excuse to talk to the "Big Dogs" in the poetry world. It's an honor to introduce this art form to people.
