Research Interests

I am interested broadly in theoretical and methodological problems in literary and cultural history: periodization; history of authorship; history and sociology of the book; epistemology of reading; history of the literary field; British culture, 1660-1832.

My next project departs from Hume's statement that identity is a grammatical not a philosophical issue, and explores historical versions of identity, self-reflexivity, and self-consciousness. It will consider, for instance, how late Platonist "epistrophē" became Locke's notion of "reflection" with the same constellation of concepts attached; and how the grammatical concept of identity becomes influential in Benveniste's analysis of the nature of pronouns and the formal apparatus of enunciation.
